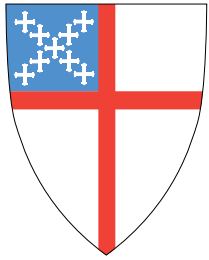

Reflections

The year was 1547. The place was England. It was a time of severe economic problems and social unrest. There was rioting and rebellion in various towns. The country was engaged in a costly war with neighboring Scotland and after some initial success it ended in a stalemate and military withdrawal. A new king was on the throne, Edward VI, and he was only 9 years old.

Sound familiar? Well, it is not exactly our situation since no moment in history is just like another. But there are often parallels and similarities. It was a tough time back then and it is a tough time now. There is fear of another economic downturn and global recession. Social unrest is erupting in riots and rebellion in places like Greece, Egypt, Syria, and more recently England. War costs in lives and money

are deeply burdensome in our own country and the lands we occupy. Leaders seem befuddled and inept and one wonders if 9 year olds might do better.

When trying times are upon us I find some comfort in looking back to see that our forbears went through trying times too. Because they endured and survived, we are here to tell about it. So I take heart from their endurance and try to muster up some courage to face the difficulties that beset us. In 1547 one of the difficulties that beset England was religious strife since the Reformation had barely been inaugurated and had not yet taken hold. Church attendance had fallen off and it seemed like many had lost their taste for religion. Again our situation is not exactly like theirs but there are some parallels. In that year a Book of Homilies was printed containing 21 sermons to be read in the churches of England for the instruction of the people. Homily 8 is entitled, "Of the Place and Time of Prayer." I will quote passages from it for your edification and mine (using

my translation from the original older English).

“Although we ought at all times, and in all places, have remembrance, and be thankful to our gracious Lord...Yet it appears to be God’s good will and pleasure, that we should at special times, and in special places, gather our selves together, to the intent that his name might be renowned, and his glory set forth in the congregation and assembly of his saints.”

“As concerning the time which Almighty God hath appointed his people to assemble together solemnly, it does appear by the fourth commandment of God: Remember, says God, that you keep the holy Sabbath day...We keep now the first day, which is our Sunday, and make that our Sabbath, that is our day of rest, in honor of our Savior Christ, who upon that day rose from death, conquering the same most triumphantly...Thus it plainly appears, that God’s will and commandment was to have a solemn day in the week, wherein the people should come together, and have in remembrance his wonderful benefits, and to render him thanks for them, as appertains to loving, kind, and obedient people.”

“Our Savior tells a parable, that a great supper was prepared, guests were bidden, many excused themselves and would not come: I tell you (says Christ) none of them shall taste my supper. This great Supper, is the true religion of Almighty God, wherein he will be worshipped in the due receiving of his Sacraments, and sincere preaching and hearing of his holy word, and practicing the same by godly lives. This feast is

now prepared in God’s feasting house, the Church, you are thereunto called and jointly bidden...Now come therefore (dearly beloved) without delay, and cheerfully enter into God’s feasting house, and become partakers of the Benefits provided and prepared for you...Come with a heart sifted and cleansed from worldly and carnal affections and desires, shake off all vain thoughts which may hinder you from God’s true service. The bird when she flies shakes her wings: Shake and prepare yourself to fly higher than all the birds of the air, that after your duty duly done in this earthly Temple and Church, you may fly up, and be received into the glorious Temple of God in heaven through Christ our Lord, to whom with the Father and the Holy Spirit be all honor and glory. Amen.”

Yes, come dearly beloved without delay and cheerfully enter into God’s feasting house, and partake of the benefits provided and prepared for you.

I am reminded of a saying of the Jews, that more than the Jews kept the Sabbath, the Sabbath kept the Jews. The same could be said for us Christians. More than we have kept Sunday, Sunday has kept us, for no one can sustain his or her faith alone without regular Sunday worship in the company of the saints (our fellow redeemed sinners).

Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console;
to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned;
and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.”

QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS

The following are highlights from the Vestry Meeting of June 12, 2011.

Financially:

As of May 31st, Jodie Johnson reported an Income Total \$85,906.13 with Expense Total of \$111,252.83; showing a deficit of \$25,346.70. After expenses are calculated, it is anticipated that the Golf Outing netted a profit of \$1,860 and the Rummage Sale a profit of \$1,750.

Peter Loder has been working on a Capital Fund Campaign for the church based on a 5 yr. plan. He presented the Vestry with an analysis of figures to be established in the Reserve Fund based on a 5 yr. replacement plan gathered by information from both Allen De Niar and our building and grounds chair John Alberti. He and the Finance Committee are still meeting to validate these figure and to put the final touches on the anticipated Capital Fund Drive for the parish.

Building and Grounds:

John Alberti reported that he is planning to have the carpet cleaned in the church entrance area, the leaking under one of our kitchen sinks has been fixed by a professional and Allen De Niar was going to look into repairing the Fountain that is placed in the garden area of the back entrance.

The Vestry is presently working on:

Expanding our Membership numbers: Peter Loder presented the Vestry with an analysis of a Five Year Growth Plan on Membership – based on age, different classifications (i.e. irregular church attendees, visitors, etc). Wendy Dockray is going to work on putting together a special committee to focus on our membership issues after the summer.

Outreach: still collecting toiletries for the migrant workers, and toys and other items for the Ramapough Indians.

Next Scheduled Vestry Meeting is Sunday, September 11th, 2011

Bishop Beckwith to Visit on October 16th

The Rt. Rev. Mark Beckwith will visit St. Bartholomew's on Sunday, October 16th. He will preach and celebrate at the 10 AM service. During the service he will lead us in the renewal of our baptismal vows and invite the congregation to come forward to the font to be sprinkled with water. As it happens we will be acknowledging the Jewish festival of Sukkot that day which includes a water pouring ceremony. Water drawn from the spring of Gihon was poured out at the altar in the Temple to appeal to God for the winter rains and for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Jesus spoke of the living water of the Holy Spirit welling up and flowing out from the believer's heart, the heart being the altar within the person who is a living temple for the presence of God.

After the service the Bishop will lead a forum in the parish hall at the time of the coffee hour and then meet briefly with the Vestry. Please do make every effort to attend the service this day. The Bishop is the chief pastor of the Diocese and the pastor of each of its parishes. Owing to the number of parishes he serves, his visits are limited to once every 3 years. His wife Marilyn will also accompany him and we look forward to welcoming her again.

Fall Festivals to Be Celebrated

As we have done in the past, we will once again acknowledge the Fall Festivals of Israel on three successive Sundays. The Fall Festivals are Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and Sukkot. We will celebrate them on October 2, 9, and 16. On those Sundays we will incorporate some prayers and readings from the synagogue liturgy.

The theme of the Fall Festivals is judgment. When the shofar sounds on Rosh Hashanah it announces the ascension of the King (God) to his throne to enter into judgment. Yom Kippur acknowledges the mercy of God that allows us to pass through the judgment. Sukkot is the joyous celebration of life granted to those who pass through the judgment. We do believe that Jesus will preside over the judgment to come at the end of this present age and those that pass through the judgment will do so by the mercy of God revealed through him. Having passed through the judgment we will be granted life in the age to come, life everlasting.

The rummage sale this year was another success. We had a lot of happy customers - people told us they not only found treasures but really enjoyed themselves. We also made over \$1,700. World at the Edge: How to Prevent Environmental and Economic Collapse

by Lester R. Brown (September).

Lester Brown is one of the **pioneers and heroes of global environmentalism**. If the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize had been extended to a third recipient, the logical candidate would have been Lester Brown. (E. O. Wilson)

In this urgent time, *World on the Edge* calls out the pivotal environmental issues and how to solve them now. We are in a race between political and natural tipping points. Can we close coal-fired power plants fast enough to save the Greenland ice sheet and avoid catastrophic sea level rise? Can we raise water productivity fast enough to halt the depletion of aquifers and avoid water-driven food shortages? Can we cope with peak water and peak oil at the same time? These are some of the issues Lester R. Brown skillfully distills in *World on the Edge*. Bringing decades of research and analysis into play, he provides the responses needed to reclaim our future.

Lester R. Brown, president of the Earth Policy Institute, is one of the world's most widely published authors, with books in more than forty languages. He has been honored with numerous prizes, including a MacArthur Fellowship, the United Nations Environment Prize, and Japan's Blue Planet Prize. He lives in Washington, DC.

Taking Back Your Faith From the American Dream: Radical

David Platt (October). A New York Times Bestseller.

COMMENTARY: In this book, David Platt challenges you to consider with an open heart how we have manipulated the gospel to fit our cultural preferences. He shows what Jesus actually said about being his disciple – then invites you to believe and obey what you have heard. And he tells the dramatic story of what is happening as a "successful" suburban church decides to get serious about the gospel according to Jesus. Finally, he urges you to join in The Radical Experiment – a one-year journey in authentic discipleship that will transform how you live in a world that desperately needs the Good News Jesus came to bring. David Platt is the pastor of The Church at Brook Hills, a four-thousand member congregation in Birmingham, Alabama.

Applications accepted for Episcopal Church educational scholarships

Deadline is October 15, 2011

Applications are now being accepted for more than 60 scholarships available through the Episcopal Church. Earmarked for education and schooling for Episcopalians, the scholarship money is derived from numerous trust funds that have amassed over the years.

Applications are reviewed by scholarship subcommittees comprised of representatives from throughout the Church. Their recommendations are then reviewed and announced by the Scholarship Committee of the Episcopal Church.

Deadline for applications is October 15, 2011. Funds will be dispersed for 2011-2012 applications and Spring 2012 requests.

Scholarship awards vary according to the availability of fund income. Payout rates are determined by the Episcopal Church Executive Council upon recommendation of its Investment Committee. Principal amounts of each fund are always maintained.

In the most previous granting of scholarships, 56 students were awarded \$206,383.03. According to the breakdown: Asian American (6), \$25,000.00; Native American (10), \$27,327.03; Black (11); \$48,000.00; Foreign Ministries (4), \$5,200.00; Miscellaneous (2), \$9,000.00; Children Missionary (16), \$63,856.00; Hispanic Ministries (7), \$28,000.00

Eligibility

In most cases, the scholarships are geared to particular audiences and students, explained Antoinette (Toni) Daniels, Co-director of Mission and Chair of the Scholarship Committee. "Trusts are given for particular areas of interest," she said. "Some of the scholarships are very specific. In all cases the financial support is meant for Episcopalians."

Among the specific communities are: American Indians/Native Americans, African-Americans, Asian-Americans, Latino/Hispanics, children of missionaries, medical missionaries, men in the ordination process, Pacific Island Americans, children of living or deceased bishops and clergy; Chinese girls; and others.

Requirements

In order to apply, Daniels stated, the applicant must:

- be an Episcopalian
- be a member of an Episcopal congregation
- have the endorsement of his/her bishop.

She stressed that only complete applications will be considered.

Summer Reading

I don't know what prompted me to pick up Scott Peck's classic, "The Road Less Traveled," from my bookshelf and reread it. It was published in 1978 so it has been some time since I first read it. A psychiatrist, Peck wrote the book based upon his experience in clinical practice to provide a roadmap for mental and spiritual growth. His point of view is simple. Life is a series of problems. Life is difficult because the process of confronting and solving problems is painful. The avoidance of problems ultimately becomes more painful. So, it is best to set about solving life's problems through discipline, the basic set of tools required to solve problems. These tools are a means of experiencing the pain of problems constructively. There are four tools: delaying gratification, acceptance of responsibility, dedication to truth or reality, and balancing.

All summer the news was about market meltdowns, real estate depreciation, debt crisis, and credit downgrades. I couldn't help but relate the news to what I was reading in Peck. Our inability to delay gratification is what got us into the crisis. Or as Peck would say, rather than schedule pain today so that we can experience pleasure tomorrow, we prefer the pleasure today and hope tomorrow will take care of itself. No one wants to accept responsibility for this. Everyone looks to someone else to blame. The distraction of the blame game enables us to avoid reality and avoid facing up to the truth of our situation. We have to change. We can't go on as before. But to change we have to be willing to "give up" something of ourselves and be flexible. This is the essence of balancing. But watching Congress and the President wrangling over a deficit reduction this summer it was obvious just how hard this is for us to do. No one wants to give up what they feel is part of them.

The book is challenging but not difficult. It is well worth reading if you haven't before or rereading if you have.

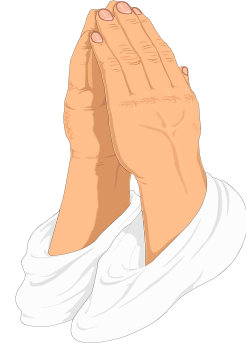
