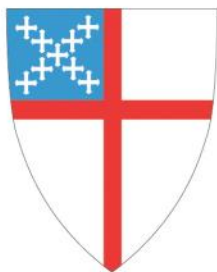

COME AND SEE!

I pray that each of you had a wonderful summer, the opportunity to relax, be with family and friends and enjoy some time either at the beach, the mountains or your own backyard. Our rectory backyard is full of wonderful vegetables and flowers thanks to the team that dedicates time each week to care for our garden. I have enjoyed time this summer in prayer and reflection while appreciating the gifts of beauty and nourishment that our garden offers.

Signs of growth are everywhere at St. Bartholomew's. Whether it is the community garden, four new acolytes joining us in worship, the wonderful music from our choir, reaching out to our community at the Memorial Day parade with our water bottles, supporting the Fire Department Wet-Down, our Ice Cream Social, the dedication of our search discernment committee, the plans for the Farm to Table Community Dinner on October 14th, or any of the other things on our growing calendar, we have many opportunities to invite

people to **Come and See**.

In the first chapter of the Gospel of John, the words, "**Come and See**" are found in two places. When some of John the Baptist's disciples saw Jesus, they wanted to follow him. They wanted to know where Jesus was staying and Jesus, in verse 39, confidently said, "**Come and See.**" In verse 46 of the same chapter in John, Philip told Nathanael that he had found the Messiah. Nathanael was not sure if he believed Philip and he gave him a "snarky" reply, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" so Philip said, "**Come and See.**"

As witnesses to the love and the power of God in Jesus Christ it is part of our call to invite people to **Come and See, Come and Experience**, or sometimes, if it is all people are comfortable doing, to **Come and Be** in the presence of a welcoming community.

When I first came to St. Bartholomew's, as a supply priest, in the fall of 2017 there were two things that I noticed over the weeks. First was a sense of sadness and confusion because the rector retired after a long and fruitful ministry of over thirty years. A ministry where new people joined the congregation, some as children that are today still part of the St.

Bartholomew's family. A ministry where outreach to people in need of food, shelter, and the offering of meeting spaces for those who need support to battle addictions were, and still are, made available. A ministry that sought to reach out to the community to share the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I have enjoyed hearing the stories of the wonderful ministry experiences that the congregation shared.

Naturally, after such a long time together as a family, Dan and Janet's retirement left a space in the work of the ministry and the lives of the family of St. Bartholomew's. I can absolutely understand the sadness of the departure of their family and the confusion as to what the next steps for the congregation would be.

At the same time, I felt a warm welcome from many members of our congregation. In their offering of hospitality to my family and me, they were saying, **Come and See**. I witnessed the determination and excitement of the team that was working together to organize the 2017 Asian Fusion Bistro. I enjoyed hearing the stories of the many things people were doing and was amazed at the wonderful way the parish hall was transformed. I remember that when I saw it, I thought to myself, "Well if I never have the opportunity to see Japan, China or any of the Asian countries in person, I'll have had a little piece of the experience in Ho-Ho-Kus."

As we moved into Lent, and preparations were underway for Holy Week, the love and care that was offered by Linda and Allen DeNiאר and their team in the preparation of the Seder Supper was beautiful to watch unfold and a testimony to preserving the history of an annual gathering, a time to come together as a community and journey through the Passover experience being fed by the words of the sacred texts, and the meal lovingly prepared. It was an honor to share

this time not only with our congregation but also with members from the Global Church who joined us.

Asking others to **Come and See** is an invitation. What is it about invitations that we find special? When we get an invitation, by phone, in the mail box or now in the digital age, as an email, we feel included and we feel happy to have the opportunity to share in the experiences of those close to us.

Invitations can sometimes be life changing. In scripture we read in Psalm 66:5 how God invited people to reflect upon all that God has done for his children. "**Come and see** what God has done: he is awesome in his deeds among mortals."

In Isaiah 55:1-3 we read how God invited all to be nourished. "Everyone who thirsts, **come** to the waters; And you who have no money, **Come**, buy and eat!" God invited everyone to be nourished in body and in spirit through the word.

In Matthew's Gospel 11:28-30 God invited those who felt the weight of suffering, "**Come** to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest." God is inviting us to share our burdens with him.

Invitations are powerful tools that can make lasting differences in people's lives.

It is now time for our congregation to start the work of discerning what direction God wants us to travel, what ministries that we should expand on or start new, and how we will, as the family of St. Bartholomew's, design and distribute our invitation to **Come and See**.

You will be receiving an invitation in the mail in the days ahead. An invitation to our Parish Day of Discernment. You are each a part of the St. Bartholomew family. Your stories are part of our history, your dreams for the future are part of the prayers that we



offer, your gifts and talents that you have been blessed with are how the ministries that we are called to do will happen.

What is God calling us to do? Together, we will be able to begin the work of determining the answer to that question. What we begin on Saturday, September 29 will also help us offer important information for the parish profile that the search discernment committee is preparing and that we will eventually send to the Diocese. **Each of you is being invited to Come, to Listen, to Share, to Reflect and to Experience the wonder of the Holy Spirit's presence in our work of discernment.**

In the first chapter of John's Gospel there are two types of invitations; one is confident and direct in leading people to go to where Jesus

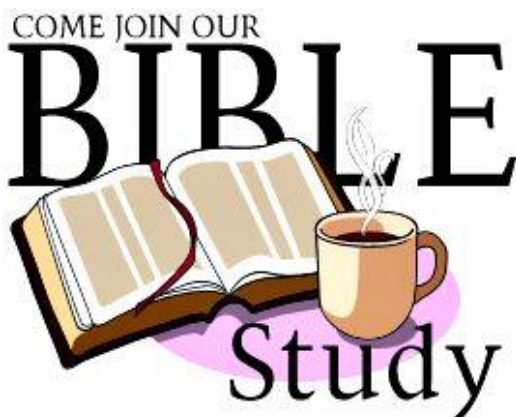
was staying. The other invitation offers an opportunity that can have different outcomes. How was Nathanael's life changed because Philip invited him to **Come and See** the Messiah? In verse 49 we read that Nathanael's life was changed because he had a chance to talk to Jesus and was moved by realizing that Jesus was thinking about him before they even met. He said, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God, the King of Israel." What a difference an invitation can make!

We, as a family, have an awesome opportunity to begin to learn what our next steps are. We are being invited to **Come and See** so we can invite others to do the same. I look forward to sharing the journey with you.

“Where We’re At” – Securing our New Rector**Volume V**

Dear Parishioners,

On behalf of our Vestry and our Search Committee, I am sharing with you “*Where We’re At Part V*” in securing a new Rector as of this Fall B-Line.

Firstly, I hope you all had a wonderful and restful fun-filled summer.

Even during these hot and kind of restful summer days, the parish has not sat idly by without moving forward. With the help of Rev. Cathie Studwell, our Parish Interim, our church has moved forward with establishing some solid ties with our local community of Ho-Ho-Kus; “Ties” perhaps in the past St. Bartholomew’s has been lacking. We showed our parish spirit and town pride during the town’s Memorial Day parade by handing out water bottles with our church’s logo to parade passersby, we organized a group to attend the town’s new firetruck “Wet Down” in June, and we invited the local neighbors to come share in our August “Ice Cream Social” after the 10am service. All this plus more to come, will benefit us as a church in moving forward within our community. By showing our presence in the town, I feel it should help strengthen our ties with our neighbors and the town of Ho-Ho-Kus, and hopefully beyond Ho-Ho-Kus.

Since Rev. Cathie’s appointment by the Vestry, she has become very involved with all our church happenings. She has reviewed our church calendar, she is working on new and exciting programs, and she is planning to reinstate some of the yearly scheduled events that have been missed; i.e. Thursday morning Healing Service and Bible Study. One of the new programs Cathie will begin this Fall is an evening Healing Service and Prayer; further information to follow. Upon review of the return of the 8am service, it was concluded that with the majority of those that attended the 8am in the past now enjoying or obligated to attend the 10am service, we will continue with only one Sunday Service at 10am until further notice.

Yes, we have secured an Interim Minister, and Rev. Cathie is doing an excellent job of guiding us as a parish through this Interim period, but we are not altering the parish’s goal to secure a full time Rector. Our church’s Search Committee has been continuing their work and mission even during the summer months. One of the items the committee has recently been involved with is changing their name to the “Search Discernment Committee”. *Reasoning:* “Part of the search is to **discern** what we are all about (our mission and vision). So, we can search for a pastor that would best fit our needs.”

During the summer the Search Discernment Committee continued their work on preparing the Parish Profile. Our Parish Profile right now is the focus of the Search Discernment Committee. It is the key tool to help our parish secure a full time Rector, the right Rector for St. Bartholomew’s Church. Due to its importance, our Search Discernment Committee is working diligently to prepare the best Profile possible. The Vestry is hopeful that this completed Profile will be done and submitted to the Diocese within the next few months. Rev. Cathie has been assisting with the profile by lending her spiritual guidance. The Search Discernment Committee is also working on securing a date to meet with our Diocese Consultant, Fr. Keith Gentry by the end of October to seek his advice and (continued)

guidance as they move forward with the search for our full time Rector.

The Vestry knows, even though most of the questions on “why so long” have stopped coming to us, some of you are still wondering what is going on. The answer hasn’t changed. Even though we have an excellent Interim Minister, we are continuing the process that has many steps to ensure that we find the right Rector for St. Bartholomew’s. The Vestry is 100% confident that we will find that right Rector. With Rev. Cathie’s leadership, I feel that our parish will grow and nourish during this transitional period into a strong united parish. A parish that will be ready to embrace a new Rector, to continue its fellowship with one another and our community, and with serving the Lord.

I hope and pray that you all continue your devotion to St. Bartholomew’s Church. As we move forward in the mission of St. Bartholomew’s church, I hope you continue to pray for our future, to support the members of our Vestry and Search Discernment Committee and Rev. Cathie Studwell, our Interim Minister. As always, should you have any individual concerns, the Vestry, Search Discernment Committee and I encourage your questions.

Communication, knowledge, strength and prayer is how we move forward as a Parish.

The Rev. Carlye J. Hughes was chosen XI Bishop of the Diocese of Newark on May 19, 2018.

Hughes, 59, comes from the Diocese of Fort Worth and is the first woman and first African-American to be elected bishop of the Diocese of Newark.

QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS

Highlights from the Vestry Meetings April and May 2018

Treasurer's Report: In April, pledges were up due to holiday collections and expenses were low due to not hiring an Interim priest yet. In May, increased maintenance expenses and the Seder dinner loss was discussed. Lower clergy expenses continued.

B-Line: Rev. Cathie will contribute an article. B-Lines are linked to the website. Announcement of Rev. Cathie's welcome celebration, Douglas Winiarski's book and Trevor Hintz' Eagle Scout project will be included. Talk about inviting Douglas to church to discuss his book with the parish; also how to recognize Trevor and his accomplishments. Rev. Cathie will recognize service team members in the fall.

Buildings & Grounds: Dave replaced the 4 bulbs in the front lot lamp posts. The rear lot lights need an electrician since they are high up. Allen De Niar will provide a window replacement estimate for the parish hall windows.

Sunday School: Peggy Kievit has retired. The Vestry will present her with a gift. Michael wants the program to continue. Rev. Cathie will speak with some parishioners and formulate a proposal for the June Vestry meeting.

Outreach: Easter food drive went well.

Finance: Jim will plan an investment meeting with Ken Espenak before the June Vestry meeting.

Community: Scott reviewed issues with the borough. Fines are still pending and a request for Certificate of Occupancy. Scott met with the borough administrator to mitigate concerns. He will consult an attorney to draft a letter to challenge the fines.

Technology: Peter has been researching social media issues and will present a report to the Vestry. Rev. Cathie will manage the Facebook page. The website needs to be updated. Kathy Gabrielle suggested a possible "live stream" of the service in the future.

Office: Names on the Military prayer list need to be identified and determined if they are still in the military. The office copier is not working well. Vestry approved the purchase of a new one. The fire alarm box in the basement needs to be upgraded since Verizon changed the phone lines to FIOS. Ho-Ho-Kus fire department's new truck wet down will be attended by Rev. Cathie. Vestry approved a donation to the fire department.

Gardens: Judy will set up the community garden for parishioners to plant. Ghada & Lisa will help put it all together. Michael wants it advertised in the B-Line and bulletin.

Hospitality: Ghada said the coffee pot is broken. Judy offered to work with Joan and order a new one.

Search Discernment Committee: The May 6th meeting was to ensure the candidate search profile is comprehensive and complete. Next meeting is June 10th.

Rev. Cathie: Placed potted plants on the rectory steps to give it a "lived in" look. A St. Bart's Happenings insert will be included in the bulletin. A celebration to announce Interim Ministry will be in June. Acolyte robes are needed for the children. Water bottles will be handed out for the Memorial Day parade. Vestry approved an ad for the Bishop's journal.

Warden Kathy: Trevor Hintz will paint the parish hall for his Eagle Scout project in late May. Allen De Niar will repair some items in the parish hall prior to the painting. Bellezza will be asked to improve the curb appeal.

Warden Michael: Property signage needs to be improved. From the curb it appears that only a Korean church worships here. Locking of the church every night is going well with Rev. Kim helping. Billy Maher of AA will be asked to help lock up. The vestry held a consensus view that the parish will likely need to remain locked until such time as the rectory is occupied. Toby suggested some revisions to the parish profile. Rev. Cathie plans to work with the Search Discernment Committee to make revisions and complete the parish profile following the discernment process. The Wardens and Rev. Cathie will arrange an update meeting with Rev. Keith Gentry.

The Vestry will next meet on September 16, 2018.

The St. Bart's Community Garden has grown well. The following list of gardeners have been working hard and we are all beneficiaries of their labor:

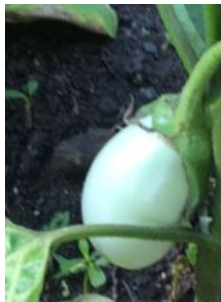

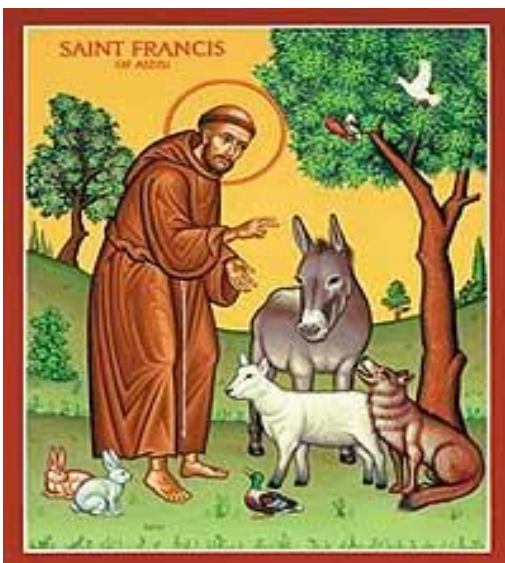

JOHN F. (JACK) COLEMAN

John ("Jack") F. Coleman, age 99, of Mahwah, NJ, died August 9, 2018, at the Villa Marie Claire Residential Hospice in Saddle River. Born to Sarah (McLean) and John A. Coleman, he grew up in Brooklyn, NY, and, after graduating from night school, continued his evening education at New York University only to have that interrupted by World War II.

He served in the 101st Horse Cavalry New York National Guard, and his army career brought him to combat in the Pacific theater – New Guinea, the Philippines, and at the initial landings in Japan at the surrender. He returned home to his wife in Teaneck, NJ, on Christmas Day 1945.

While in the service, Jack married Eleanor Sigmund and shared 67 wonderful years, having three daughters, Janice Rudd, Carol and Diane Coleman; five grandchildren, and four great grandchildren.



Among his employers, Jack spent 40 years in sales shared between the United States Rubber Co. and Kaiser Aluminum & Chemical Co. From the latter, he retired in 1982 in sales management.

He built a home in Ho-Ho-Kus in 1962 where he remained until moving to Brandywine Senior Living, Mahwah, NJ in October 2015. Jack was a member of Squadron C Club, Hobbyists Unlimited, VFW, American Legion, and active in various church and charity groups. Jack and Eleanor, who died in 2010, were long-time well known members of St. Bartholomew's.

A private memorial service and interment was planned for late August.

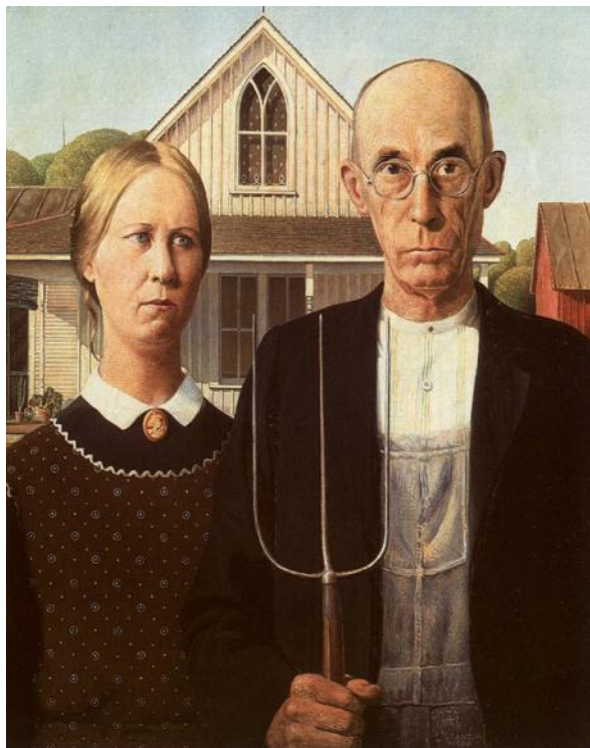
