

Rev. Cathie's Reflections

In Matthew's Gospel we read about Jesus calming a storm, "Late that day he said to them, 'Let's go across to the other side.' They took him in the boat as he was. Other boats came along. A huge storm came up. Waves poured into the boat, threatening to sink it. And Jesus was in the stern, head on a pillow, sleeping! They roused him, saying, 'Teacher, is it nothing to you that we're going down?' Awake now, he told the wind to pipe down and said to the sea, 'Quiet! Settle down!' The wind ran out of breath; the sea became smooth as glass. Jesus reprimanded the disciples: 'Why are you such cowards? Don't you have any faith at all?'" (The Message-Mark 4:35-40)

As I write this article, we have just returned from a vacation week in Ocean Grove. We love the Jersey Shore and especially Ocean Grove. As we arrived, we were met by the roaring ocean due to the impact of Hurricane Henri. Thank God Ocean Grove did not have any substantial damage from the storm, but the sea was, what people call, "angry."

As I watched from the boardwalk I wondered if the sea was angry or simply responding to the force of the wind on the water? Determined to remerge as a place to welcome people to rest, reflect and play on its shores, the ocean seemed to say, I need to get through this, and I will, so we can be together again.

The significance of Jesus calming the storm is pertinent to what's happening in our world today and is evidence of God's love for us. Jesus wanted people to know that yes there would be fear as storms raged in our lives, but he would always be with us to provide and protect even in our darkest hours.

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on our lives. The storms of the pandemic are both internal and external. The intense surges of emotion within us are due to our humanity while the chaotic circumstances around us seem to be beyond our control. I'm sure that all of us

on some level can relate to the disciples' fears and their amazement as Jesus calmed the storm.

Like the disciples, fear continues to grip many people's hearts as we now face the Delta variant of the COVID virus. All of us during this pandemic are feeling our humanity deeply as fear continues to sweep across the world like a dark cloud.

Jesus was human too and he understood fear, but his knowledge and love of God gave him the power to overcome it.

"It was for people like us, children of Abraham. That's why he had to enter into every detail of human life. Then, when he came before God as high priest to get rid of the people's sins, he would have already experienced it all himself — all the pain, all the testing — and would be able to help where help was needed." (The Message -Hebrews 2:17-18)

After Jesus calmed the storm, he asked the disciples where their faith was. This is a good question for us to ask ourselves as COVID-19 rages on. There are times during this COVID storm that we all rage with anger over the many disruptions in our lives. There are times where we grieve the loss of the many people who have died. There are times when we might feel that God has abandoned us.

Yes, Jesus, in his painful time in the Garden of Gethsemane asked of God, "Why have you forsaken me?" Jesus knows how we feel, and Jesus is standing by us. If the fear in us is stronger than our faith, we can turn to God, and he'll teach us because his mercy endures forever.

God remembered us when we were down, *His love never quits*.

Rescued us from the trampling boot, *His love never quits*.

Takes care of everyone in time of need, *His love never quits*.

Thank God, who did it all! *His love never quits!* (The Message-Psalm 36:23-26)

Even in these trying times, while the seas rage, we have a call and a mission. Our mission is to continue to work together to give witness through our words and actions that the kingdom of God is ours. It is our life, our blessing, our peace, our protection and it is for all the children of God.

We will come through this storm together. Some things will be the same and others will change, but if we keep the Word of God as our foundation and we continue to study and be open to the revelations that God wants us to have we will be ready to welcome people to be in fellowship together in-person again.

The apostle Paul writes in Colossians 3:1-2, "So if you're serious about living this new resurrection life with Christ, act like it. Pursue the things over which Christ presides. Don't shuffle along, eyes to the ground, absorbed with the things right in front of you. Look up and be alert to what is going on around Christ — that's where the action is." (The Message)

Jesus urges us to keep focused on our God and His purpose for us even during the storms of life and be confident that the sun, and the Son, will shine upon our shores.

OUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS

Highlights from the Vestry Meeting May 2021

NOTE: June 2021 Vestry minutes have not been approved yet, so therefore not included in this summary.

Treasurer:

Dave Ackerman reported that our investments did well in April, and with the first PPP Loan being forgiven, it helped turn a \$15,900 loss in March into a \$10,300 gain in April. Vestry was given the approved Balance Sheet and Operating Account figures from January and the 2021 Budget figures of April for one final review before our May 2021 Annual meeting. The Vestry was informed that for our June meeting, our parish administrator, Ann Woods will address the Vestry on the restricted funds budget.

Community Garden / Pollinator Garden:

The garden committee reported they are preparing the garden for our 2021 harvest season with donations by Home Depot, Rohslers of Allendale, Waldwick Gardens, and plants by parishioners. The Rectory tenants have been provided a schedule of the weekly work times in the garden, with planting to begin May 29th.

Some plants in the Pollinator Garden did not come back yet, so the garden team is working with Mari Kamidoi to investigate what is better suited for this area. Monday, May 17th, 2021, work will begin on the layout and installation of the donated inscribed pavers for the Pollinator Garden.

Outreach:

Lisa Wysession stated we had a good diaper drive on May 15th, 2021, and that our next food drive for Oasis is May 22nd. Discussion on the need to advertise more on the need for "toiletries" when we do our next Goshen collection.

Building and Grounds:

Our building sexton, Bill Hughes, is working on the painting of the repaired area of the Rector's office from a water leak, the front garden American Flag has been replaced, and the outside water faucets have been opened in anticipation of the upcoming community garden and other garden watering.

Rev. Cathie:

- Children's Ministry is hard to do using Zoom meetings, but it is coming along. The children are presently working on "I Am Statements."
- No date yet for Confirmation, other than it should be Fall 2021.
- Celebration of New Ministry is planned for Saturday, June 12th, 2021; 100 people are allowed to attend. Invitations will be sent first to our Parishioners, then to the public.

Od Business:

- **Vestry Exact Commissions:** Class of 2021 will be Judy Malhotra Outreach, Peggy Kievit Evangelism, Michael Gnerre Technology, Ghada Harb Warden and Worship, Wayne Kamidoi Marketing, Lisa Wysession Hospitality, Kathy Gabrielle Warden and Building/Grounds,
- **The AA Group:** The Vestry reconfirmed that our AA group is allowed usage of our parking lot, and the wearing of masks is required.
- The B-Line Cover will be updated after Annual Meeting.
- **New Directory**: Overhauling of listing into categories of Members and Friends. 66 Families noted as members and 87 as friends.
- **HR** (**Human Resources**): Presented the Vestry with the guidelines to the church's employment policy for view and vote in June.

New Business:

- Sunday Service Tributes: Instead of Sunday flower donations, we will offer "in memory of" honor services.





For our Sunday services, we especially can use more Collection Counters and Lectors. These are not difficult jobs, and you would be scheduled only about once a month.

A Counter stays after the service and counts the money received plus what has come in during the week. He or she opens the offering envelopes and writes the amount on each one. Any loose checks are recorded on a counting sheet along with the total of the envelopes. The checks are endorsed and a deposit ticket is filled out. The job seldom takes more than 15 or 20 minutes.

A Lector stands at the lectern and reads the Lesson and Epistle and leads the congregation in the Psalm. The texts of these are emailed to the Lector several days before the service so the Lector can get familiar with them. Usually the reading and psalm takes less than 5 minutes.

JUNE MARKEL



Adult Formation at St. Bartholomew's Journey With Paul-A Study of Romans





Performing will be Joe McCaffrey and His Quartet with Emily Lucas providing vocals. They will be playing songs from the Great American Songbook. Light refreshments will be served after the concert and attendees will have an opportunity to meet loe and the other performers.

The performers are graduates or current students at William Paterson University. They include:

Joe McCaffrey - Drummer Joe McCaffrey began honing his craft with pots and pans in the kitchen. His affinity for music apparent, his parents soon purchased him his first drum kit, and thus the career of a drummer was born. Upon enrolling at William Paterson University, McCaffrey became enamored with the sounds of jazz, and it is in the jazz scene that he has begun etching his name. Now a graduate of WPU, he looks forward to a lifetime devoted to music.

Alex Delazzari - Born in Italy, saxophonist Alex Delazzari moved to the US when he was a young boy. He cut his teeth on the streets of Washington, DC, but gravitated to New York for its sovereign jazz scene. A graduate of William Paterson University, Delazzari absorbs as much as he can from all New York has to offer, and his vast knowledge of the music can be heard in his playing.

Elliot Bernard - The tinkling sounds of Elliot Bernard's piano first migrated from Virginia to New Jersey in Fall 2018, but already his piano can be heard all through the tri-state area. Rooted in the tradition of pianists such as Bud Powell and Oscar Peterson, Bernard is a senior at William Paterson University and an up-and-coming star on the New York scene.

Matt Holmes - Hailing from the hills of West Virginia, Matt Holmes came to the Garden State in Fall 2018 and has been in demand as a bassist ever since. With infectious groove, melodic soloing and an amicable attitude, his senior year at William Paterson University is sure to be only the beginning of an illustrious career.

Emily Lucas is a jazz, soul, and classical vocalist native to the Asbury Park area. While studying at William Paterson University under Nancy Marano, she has been touring with the Motown band Total Soul, traveling across the East Coast. This summer, she made her jazz debut with the Garden State Jazz Orchestra, and began studying under Catherine Russell.

William Paterson University is known for its Jazz Program, which attracts students from all over the United States and around the world. Among the members of its renowned faculty are Bill Charlop, who won a Grammy with Tony Bennett several years ago.

We look forward to seeing our parishioners and friends at what promises to be a fun afternoon filled with beautiful songs from the past, played by some very talented young musicians.

COMMUNITY GARDEN

Welcome back to the garden! As you can see from the pictures below, our St. Bart's Community Garden is bursting forth. Zucchini was the first to show its face, and the yellow squash is not far behind. One green pepper so far, but multiple tiny little baby peppers have emerged.

Chives are there waiting to be pulled out and eaten, basil is ready to be picked, and our tomatoes have been staked and are growing tall. Kale is abundant and ready to harvest...the more you pick, the more the plant will produce. Japanese eggplants are growing into long, beautiful, purple vegetables.

If vegetables only have blossoms and no fruit - one may need more pollinator plants nearby. Lucky for us we have Mari's garden next door! Zucchini have ample amounts of Vitamin A, Vitamin C and antioxidants as long as prepared with skin on, They are best fresh from the vine and into the frying pan! They pair well with chives, basil and eggplants (aubergines) which are on the way!

In our last issue we asked what was the significance of this date carved over the entrance to our church. Well, that's the year the building was built. But not as a church. It began life as a one-room schoolhouse on Hollywood Avenue west of Sheridan Ave. Around the turn of the 20th century religious services began to be held there, and in 1904 the Ho-Ho-Kus



Mission Association was formed as a mission of Christ Church in Ridgewood. Ten years later, on September 14, 1914, the Bishop of Newark approved the establishment of a parish to be known as St. Bartholomew's Church,

and regular services were held in the former schoolhouse for many years.



In 1930 a Parish House was built on Sheridan Avenue on property donated to St. Bart's. After many years of debate over building a new church, in 1948 the former schoolhouse was moved to Sheridan Ave. and attached to the Parish House.

Over the years the church and Parish House have been expanded and modernized. But when you worship on Sunday, you're sitting in the original 1871 schoolhouse! Thus we observe the building's 150th Anniversary in 2021.







