Every day during this year we have been bombarded with news stories, medical reports, all sorts of statistics concerning the spread of this horrific virus in the United States and around the world. We have had to radically change our lifestyles as individuals and as a church family without the knowledge that a return to what we know as normal is anywhere in sight.

The COVID-19 restrictions that we have had to adhere to, so we can do our part to help stop the spread of the virus, have come with costs of their own. Our mental, social, and spiritual health has been tested. Many people are experiencing anxiety and depression from months and months of isolation. The social opportunities found in work, school, and community activities have all but ground to a halt

and been replaced with Zoom meetings and Google hangouts. Although I for one am incredibly grateful that we have the gift of technology it is not a replacement for in-person gatherings. Our economy has been adversely affected. Many people have lost jobs and businesses have had to cut expenses or close altogether. Spiritual health has also been affected. We, as Episcopalians, miss the celebration of the eucharist each week. Baptisms, weddings, and funerals have had to be postponed for the most part and if they could take place, they did so with limited numbers of participants.

At our last Journey Forward
Team meeting we talked about
what we missed the most during
this past year. One of the things
we all agreed on was our
missing the ability to hug people.
Reaching out to people as we
share a moment of prayer or at
the peace, our need for touch,
for physical connection, is so
human and holy, its absence
makes our bodies ache.

We are now in the third week of Lent and life is still not how we know it and our frustration, anger and sadness has only grown since this time last year. Perhaps, during Lent, (continued)

instead of taking something on or giving something up, what we can do is care for ourselves in the best way possible. We can decide to intentionally pause and take stock of our lives as they are in this moment, to express what we hope our lives will be like in the future, and most importantly live in an attitude of gratitude for the blessings that we have right now.

Yes, Lent can be a time to be grateful that God knows each one of us by name, loves us, and invites us to continue, even in these challenging times, to grow closer to him, to discern what our call is and embrace the opportunities it presents. We are invited to live into this Lent, this season of repentance and transformation, confident in the knowledge that God is with us and through our baptism to live in the power of Jesus' resurrection.

In Chapter 1 of John's Gospel (v18) we read: "No one has ever seen God." This sentence does not mean that because we have not seen that God does not exist, but rather it invites us to intentionally reflect on how we do experience God even in our darkest times. Is it in those moments of unexpected awe when we feel something transcendent in our lives, that we know God is with us. Perhaps a special conversation with a trusted friend, a piece of music or a special work of art, something that you read that immediately addresses a need or a question that you have been struggling with or the simplicity of a beautiful sunrise. All these things and so many more help us to know that God has kept and will continue to keep his promise found in Matthew 28 "I will be with you to the end of the age."

In the end, the journey of Lent is always richer in a community, even a virtual community.

As much as our hearts ache to be able to worship together, to share in fellowship time, as well as all the other things that we do as the family of St. Bartholomew's, we need to continue a little while longer knowing that our virtual meetings are also Holy Gatherings.

In Hebrews 10:24-25 it says, "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another – and all the more as you see the Day approaching." Each of you has encouraged me to carry on; your words of support, the sharing of your stories, have blessed my life through this year. I believe that the fact that we can meet on-line is a gift from God. I also believe that when we see each other on the fourth Saturday of each month, when we bring food for Oasis, wearing our masks, staying physically distant, that we receive the gift of knowing we are continuing to offer ministry to those in need and can smile even though our faces are covered. I believe that we are remarkably close to being able to gather again for inperson worship. I believe that God is working to heal our world.

This is not the time to give up, it is the time to push on, keep praying, studying, sharing, discerning our identity, and living into our ministry. Remember there are people who are waiting to Come and See and when that time comes the family of St. Bartholomew's will open our doors and our computer screens to invite them in. I look forward to sharing the future with you.



QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS

Highlights from the Vestry Meetings October and November 2020

NOTE: December 2020 and January 2021 minutes have not been approved as of this writing so cannot be combined in these highlights.

Treasurer:

Dave Ackerman's reports indicate that pledge payments and facility usage donations are below budget due to COVID 19 restrictions and attendance, which is increasing our deficit. As of October, we are showing a deficit in our budget of \$20,769. A one-year Certificate of Deposit has been issued by Bank of America for the security deposit of \$1,850 received for the rental of the Rectory.

Community Garden:

Judy Malhotra confirmed that the garden is done for the season, and more plants are needed for the back-courtyard area come spring. Some plants have not done well in the Pollinator Garden at the Rectory, so in springtime there will be a review of what happened and what should be replanted.

Outreach:

Food donations for Oasis are scheduled for November 21st, December 19th, and January 23rd. The Angel Tree this year will be collections of new hats, gloves, and scarves.

Building and Grounds:

John Alberti informed the Vestry that the window in Rev. Cathie's office is leaking again. Homestead Roofing will be contacted. Allen De Niear's firm did the following repairs to the Rectory: exterior front door frame, upper gutter attachment, and outside shingle chimney area. The church's plumber had to replace the shower head in the Ist floor bathroom of the rectory due to leakage, and a new microwave for the Rectory was needed and approved for purchase by the Vestry.

Memorial Garden

On behalf of the Memorial Garden committee, Allen DeNiear reported to the Vestry that as of October 2020 a total of \$20,600 has been received in donations for the replenishing of the Garden's Restricted Funds. Peggy Kievit and Pam Miller have volunteered to hang the appropriate seasonal wreaths in both memorial gardens at church.

Rev. Cathie:

- She is very thankful for the great job our Marketing Team did for promoting the "Blessing of the Animals" which got an article and photos of us featured in local papers.
- Children's Ministry is going well and an Epiphany virtual pageant is being planned for that season.
- This year's Confirmation Class is moving forward through the Hebrew Scriptures.
- Happy to report that our Stewardship Program is growing each week with our "Treasures, Fears and Concerns to our Faith" theme.

Fundraising:

- 1. Shop for Causes was approved another \$1,000 purchase by the Vestry of gift cards.
- 2. Cookbook recipes are being formatted to make into a book; price to be determined.
- 3. As of this date, 18 Engraved Pavers have been ordered for the Pollinator Garden.

Old Business:

- The Vestry has reviewed the current Vestry Term Limits for January 2021. Michael Gnerre has agreed to remain on the Vestry as a Vestry member when his term of Warden expires.
- The Rectory is now being rented for a one-year term to Rev. Young (Paul) Yoon and Sunmee Su, and their family, beginning November 1, 2020 at the monthly rate of \$1,850.
- The allowance of AA to meet in our parish hall with 25 in attendance is on hold.

New Business:

- Jay Studwell advised the Vestry on the advanced filters recommended by the Diocese for our HVAC System to insure better ventilation, and the upgrading to our heating system to an HRV/ERV system for better recovery for heat vs. energy. Investigation of pricing for an HRV/ERV system was approved.
- Rev. Cathie has received a quote of \$7,900 from Nick Hrecznyat of Resound Technologies to supply our church with a hard-wired Technical AV Deck that will control volume, show videos on Zoom and Facebook, have two cameras, and training. To help fund this upgraded expense, Rev. Cathie asked for Vestry approval, and received it, to apply for a Diocese Grant of \$5,000.
- Rev. Cathie is looking to put together an HR Team to handle employment rules and concerns for the church. Kathy Gabrielle and Ghada Harb have volunteered for this team.

> We continue to receive donations through the on-line Vanco giving service. It is working quite well. Thank you for your generosity.




We applied for and received the PPP Loan and the Diocese COVID-19 Loan, to assist us with payroll expenses.



News from Oasis

St. Bart's has been very important for Oasis these past few months. We averaged 60 bags of groceries every time we had our monthly food drive. It wasn't just members of our Church who contributed, but local good Samaritans who saw our sandwich board out front on Sheridan Ave. It pays to advertise!

This pandemic has been particularly hard for the families in Paterson who are employed in jobs that cannot be performed at home on a computer screen. On an average, Oasis serves

100's of grab and go meals daily, as well as dozens of bags of groceries so that families have food in their cupboards. So much of these groceries came from the folks at St. Bart's as well as some of the school supplies that are needed to aid with their children's virtual learning.
