

One of the ways that people learned of our outreach ministry of food collection, blessing of the animals, and other aspects of our church life was through the work of our marketing team. Our increased presence in print and social media platforms have helped us to reach out to a wider audience. The marketing team is always thinking about new ways to invite people to "come and see".

We gave the gift of reaching outside our comfort zones to build community. Starting with Zoom in the early days of the pandemic and progressing to the "St. Bart's On-Line Studio" we have been able to expand our reach to the community, state, nation and who knows, maybe the world. We have only just begun to explore the possibilities of on-line evangelism and ministry.

We were singing all the way. What is singing, really? Singing is telling a story or sharing a witness with the words being set to music. Soon did a wonderful job of keeping the music flowing at the morning prayer services, in Sunday worship on Zoom, and eventually as we began to open the doors of our church. We all did a wonderful job of keeping our witness, in word and action, flowing through all the many months.

I know that singing without music was painful in the life of our church family coming during a time that none of us could have ever imagined. These past fifteen months have been filled with fear, anxiety, anger, and sadness. The questions of how the pandemic happened or why it happened may never be known. When we also factor in the political and social justice challenges, and the question of what would happen to the church as we knew it, many of us, myself included felt overwhelmed, but we kept singing.

On June 12<sup>th</sup> we will be able, once again, to connect our words with music as we celebrate together. There is a lot to be grateful for and a lot to look forward to. As we move forward, we do so knowing that the music of our lives is found in the love that we share and that is truly worth celebrating.

#### **QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS**

#### Highlights from the Vestry Meetings December 2020 through April 2021

#### **Treasurer:**

Dave Ackerman reports that our investments increased by \$115,000 from a year ago, regular contributions have been doing better than expected with an increase of \$4,610, the PPP Loan #1 was received and the forgiveness application has been submitted, the PPP Loan #2 has been applied for, our bank account is reconciled through March 2021 and our Diocese Pledge has been increased by \$15,620 by our increased contributions.

The 2021 Budget was approved by the Vestry at the April meeting for presentation to the parish at the Annual Meeting scheduled for May 16, 2021.

The Vestry was informed that for our June meeting, our parish administrator, Ann Woods will address the Vestry on the restricted funds budget.

#### **Community Garden:**

The garden team knows that there will be some challenges this year to commit to this garden and respect the privacy of our tenants. A Zoom meeting was scheduled with the tenants, Rev. Cathie, Ghada Harb and Kathy Gabrielle to address concerns that both sides have before moving into the planting / harvesting season. The team met April 20<sup>th</sup> to come up with a schedule on who would be working in the community garden and what days they would work, to avoid any conflicts with the Rectory tenants. The committee is working on securing donations for this garden through Home Depot, Lowes, and Roshlers of Allendale.

#### Outreach:

Lisa Wysession alerted the Vestry that besides the monthly food drives for Oasis, on May 8, 2021 there would be a diaper and toiletry drive for the migrant workers of Goshen. Peggy Kievit will deliver the items to Goshen.

#### **Building and Grounds:**

John Alberti informed the Vestry that Homestead Roofing has fixed the leak in the Rector's office and that the repair and the re-painting of damaged wall area will begin. Homestead has submitted a bill of \$1,300 to replace the damaged gutter in the front of the church. (The Vestry did approve this invoice). John is securing bids for a new fence around the Community Garden, with an entrance gate to this garden. Back door to parking lot is still having an issue with secured locking; lock smith will be called in.

Linda DeNiear has informed the Vestry that she is taking care of the restoration and repair needed to the fountain located in the back area of the church.

#### **Fundraising:**

- I. "Shop for Causes" gift cards will now be available the  $2^{nd}$  Saturday of each month besides during the food drive. For the April food drive, there is \$450 in cards.
- 2. Paver orders for the Pollinator Garden are pretty much done.
- 3. New Fundraiser idea: The selling of dried herbs.

#### **Rev. Cathie:**

- Children's Ministry began back on January 24<sup>th</sup> after the Christmas holiday, took a break for a time, resuming in May and go through June.
- Planning on a new Adult study "the Love of Courage".
- No date from the Diocese for this year's Confirmation of our young people.

#### Old Business:

- **The Vestry Term Limits** have been reviewed for the class of 2021. Michael Gnerre, John Alberti and Lisa Wysession have all agreed to remain on the Vestry as a different committee head. Ghada Harb has volunteered to be a Warden.
- **Technology:** The church did receive a grant of \$1,900.83 from the Diocese to use towards our new AV Deck in the church. The team is addressing the poor sounding of the organ playing on Zoom and having a better hook up to system for the "mikes" to be heard better. The purchase of a second TV screen for the Sanctuary was approved at the February meeting.



- **Metro Filters and ERV System** for Sanctuary have been installed using Advanced Central Heating for our ERV System at a cost of \$4,800.
- **The AA Group** is looking to have more than the 2 meetings per week allowed in the Parish Hall. This request has been approved providing the AA Group would pay for the extra cleaning needed by our Sexton; to date no additional inside meetings have begun. The AA Group was granted the use of the parking lots for a few meetings during the week; to date they have not accepted the church's offer.
- The B-Line Cover is in the process of being updated.

#### **New Business:**

- An HR team, consisting of Rev. Cathie, Ghada Harb and Kathy Gabrielle has been formed and met twice to have a booklet on Employment Rules.
- **Planning Committee** has the church going "live" now on You Tube. They are also working on a celebration to honor Mari Kamidoi achievement of the Girl Scout Gold Award.
- Marketing Team is working on a marketing blast "All Things Garden" with a focus on stories of our Community and Pollinator Gardens. The team is looking to see how we can connect to those that are on YouTube and Facebook, and Ghada Harb volunteered to see how we can add information in Facebook and YouTube about donating to the church.
- **Membership of the Parish** has been reviewed and organized so that going forward we will have a correct reporting of our membership total to the Diocese.
- New Parish Directory is being worked on and will be distributed during the Annual Meeting on May 16, 2021.

The meeting took place outdoors on the Rectory grounds. Rev. Cathie Studwell chaired the meeting, her first since she was named Rector. Twenty-three parishioners attended.

Ghada Harb was elected to a two-year term as Warden, succeeding Michael Gnerre who was elected a Vestry member along with John Alberti, Peggy Kievit and Lisa Wysession for three-year terms. Treasurer Dave Ackerman presented his annual report for 2020 and budget for 2021; both were unanimously approved.

Minutes of the previous year's meeting were approved, and reports of the various members were presented. (These reports were included in the meeting package emailed to the parish before the meeting. Copies are available in the church office.)





#### **News from Oasis**

Study endlessly,
Persevere always,
Work perpetually,
And wait patiently.
Time has a way of recognizing talent

This has always been my favorite quote. Louise Nevelson was a 20th century artist who stayed true to her calling no matter

what was happening in her life. It worked out well in the end for her. She lived to see her work recognized by her peers and enjoyed by millions.

This past Fall I had the pleasure and joy to work with a 13 year old young woman from Paterson, through Oasis, who has a passion for art, but no formal training and not much of an opportunity to

grow her Art. I was asked to mentor her and help her put together a portfolio that she needed in order to leave the Paterson school system and attend a high school in Wayne with a focus in Art. We met once a week for an hour using Zoom as our studio. Not an ideal situation for teaching art but she embraced it eagerly. Her name is Alexandra and I am happy to report that she was accepted into the Art Program at one of her choice schools. However, she sets her goals high and was really wanting to attend a different and more prestigious school in Wayne. She was not accepted into their Art Program but



was accepted into their Computer Science program, which was her second choice. I'm very proud of her and of how hard she worked and I know that she will continue to grow as an artist, just perhaps in a new and different medium!

I continue to teach children ages 6-10 once a week using Zoom. The students, about 15 to 20 in number, are part of the STEAM program, which allows them to have a hands-on art experience once a week for 40 minutes. Oasis provides these children, who have not attended in-person school at all this year in Paterson, tutoring in academics from 3:30-6:00, 5 days a week and Art on Fridays. They begin with a hot meal which often includes groceries that St. Bart's has provided for them.

Your monthly food donations are helping these children more than you can imagine. They are getting the knowledge and nourishment to help them be all they can be, and more.

Oasis is expanding with new construction and a larger space that will allow more mothers and children to learn and grow and have the opportunity they otherwise never would have to realize their dreams of a productive life. Joan Lupardo and I will be resuming our in-person "Rise and Shine" art classes in September, and we invite any and all of you to join us on Saturdays for a morning full of children eager to learn about ART!

Just in closing I will share with you the Oasis Mission statement, it's a good one:

"FEED, CLOTHE, EDUCATE AND EMPOWER" women and children in need. First you have to Feed.

#### GOING FOR THE GOLD

Many athletes around the world will be competing this summer in the 2021 Olympics going for gold. While we look forward to seeing our United States athletes compete, we need to acknowledge that there are other paths to gold.

There is also gold for honor and service, and Ho-Ho-Kus native, Mari Kamidoi achieved that when she earned her Girl Scout Gold Award this year.

Mari began her Girl Scout journey in kindergarten. From the start, she learned about being a part of the community and the importance of service to help make a positive difference. Through the years, Mari learned the value of good self-esteem, inspiring herself and others to realize their potential - that everyone has a voice and a witness to be shared.



Mari, a senior at Northern Highlands High School, began work on her Gold Award project in March 2020, which is the highest award that a Girl Scout can achieve. Girls who pursue their Gold Award aspire to transform an idea and vision for change into an actionable plan with measurable, sustainable, and far-reaching results. **The Gold Award is awarded to fewer than 6% of eligible Girl Scouts annually.** Each Gold Award Girl Scout spends I - 2 years on her project. Approximately one million Girl Scouts have earned the Gold Award or its equivalent since the inception of the award in 1916.

In the spring of 2020, during the COVID-19 pandemic, when so many people stopped doing things they love, Mari chose to pursue one of her passions: to participate in helping sustain our environment. She created a pollinator garden on the grounds of St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church. Mari believes that pollinators are vital to maintaining a healthy ecosystem. Pollinators rely on native plants that are sustainable without the use of pesticides and by creating a wildflower garden, pollination can occur and help create a healthy environment for all life.

Once completed, the pollinator garden was named as a State of New Jersey Certified Wildlife Habitat. Because of her dedication to the specifics of this project, including design of the garden, reaching out for support and donations as well as creating a website, <a href="mailto:preservepollinators.com">preservepollinators.com</a> to teach people about the project, Mari truly earned her Gold Award.

Mari's passion for protecting our environment is also evidenced in the artwork that she creates. After graduating, she will be attending the University of Michigan majoring in art and design. She believes that through her artwork and witness to the power of protecting the environment she can continue to develop her leadership skills even further and keep going for the gold!

We have peppers, cukes, kale eggplant, zucchini, yellow squash, trombetta squash, Japanese eggplant, chives, tomatoes and basil.


We will continue to share our harvest locally as well as with Oasis in Paterson.

#### WHAT'S THIS?

What's the significance of this date carved over the entrance to the Church? Hint: It's an important date in the life of our Church. And so important that it calls for a 150th Anniversary commemoration.

#### ST. BART'S ON-LINE STUDIO

"LIVE from Ho-Ho-Kus – It's SUNDAY MORNING!"



Does anyone besides me remember the 1950s black-and-white television cameras, like the stock shot of the one at left? Welcome to the 21<sup>st</sup> Century! Our "studio" consists of two cameras only 6 inches high, mounted on the front corners of the Nave. They can pan, tilt and zoom, to focus on the altar, organ, Nave and anything in between, all controlled with just a few pushbuttons and a joystick.



Our on-line studio launched on March 7 when we began live streaming our Sunday morning worship services with our new audio/visual system, installed by Nick Hreczny of Resound Technologies. The \$8,000 cost was funded wholly by several parishioners' contributions and a grant from the Diocese.

Our newly-formed Tech Team consists of Jay Studwell supervising Dave Ackerman, Mike Egbert, Dave Gabrielle, and Andrew and Catherine Sommerfeld. These "vergers" take turns operating the system each Sunday morning. The service is broadcast live at 10 AM over YouTube, Zoom and Facebook, and can also be viewed later on YouTube.
