

Rev. Cathie's Reflections

Out of all the voices that surround us, all the news that we watch or read, the advertising telling us the best way to live, the social media posts expressing many conflicting ways to look at life, a question for us could be, "How can I discern God's call for me in this time and place amidst all the noise and confusion?

While God calls all persons to ministry, for those that answer the call, they should think about what their impact, using God given gifts, could have in God's kingdom on earth and what an awesome opportunity for exploration that is.

Living in response to God's call involves trusting the Lord amid the darkness and confusion while waiting for the peaceful light to dawn. But the question remains, how we are to discern God's voice in the midst of the chaos of the world.

Times of uncertainty have existed for thousands of years. We are not the first generation to face chaos in the world. In the book of Isaiah

by November 20

God revealed Himself to Isaiah in heavenly glory to confirm that He is King regardless of what was happening on earth. This intimate exchange with God prepared Isaiah to hear and respond to God's call!

Well maybe not at first. Initially Isaiah expressed doubt. In Isaiah 6:5 we get a glimpse of what he was thinking.

"Woe to me!" I cried. "I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the King, the Lord Almighty."

Despite his intelligence, and devout faith, Isaiah thought of himself as one who would not be qualified to serve.

In response to Isaiah's obvious doubts, God acted.

"Then one of the seraphim flew to me with a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with tongs from the altar. With it he touched my mouth and said, "See, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away and your sin atoned for." (v. 6-7).

The angel took a burning coal to Isaiah's lips, where the words of sin were spoken the same lips that would be the instrument of his future ministry. His heart was willing to serve and (continued)

that was all God needed to work with. He removed the block so Isaiah could move forward.

And move forward he did. In verse 8 we read,

"Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying,
"Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?"
And I said, "Here am I. Send me!"

God revealed Himself to Isaiah for the purpose of preparing him for ministry. Isaiah heard the voice of God speaking to the community of angels, asking, "Who will be the messenger to my people? Who will go for us?" And this time Isaiah answered without hesitation, "Here Am I. Send Me." The assurance of God's forgiveness and a new sense of freedom were evident in Isaiah's desire to answer the call. I can close my eyes and imagine Isaiah having a big smile and saying I'm free and I want to serve my Lord! He jumps with joy as he responds to the call and says, "Here Am I. Send Me!"

There are many people in the family history of St. Bartholomew's that answered the call in the same way, "Here Am I. Send Me!" One of the things that we can do as we move forward in our ministry plans is look to those who came before us and the seeds that they planted, the ministries that built the foundation of the response to God's call for the family of St. Bartholomew's. That response has been built over the decades and it calls out to us today, calls us to continue to grow those established seeds.

If we truly want to serve God and minister to others, we need to authentically accept God's invitation. We do that by examining our hearts and minds. We acknowledge the gifts that we have, and we look to improve in areas where we have said to ourselves, "I could have done that better". Then we need to take time to build

a relationship with God, trusting that God will speak to us through the sacred texts, music, art, literature and in many other ways. Just as God took the emotional and psychological blocks away from Isaiah, he is ready to do the same for us. God longs to build our confidence through his love and open our minds to the infinite possibilities to minister to ourselves and others as confident co-heirs with the Son of God, the Messiah, Jesus Christ.

The relationship is built through prayer, study, and conversation with brothers and sisters. In conversation, it is helpful to share where you are in your life journey and what you feel you need from God to be an enthusiastic voice for the Gospel.

This summer we have looked at the seeds of hospitality, self-care, nourishment, witness, faith, and the types of soil that our seeds are planted in. We are going to continue our study by looking at how the members of our church family who we love and see no longer on earth planted and harvested their seeds, the seeds from which the wonderful ministries of our church began.

We will focus on one or two people each month for the next year, beginning on September 10th with the ministry of George and Helen Clark. Join us on Welcome Back Sunday as we honor their memory and celebrate their ministry. How did they discern their call in their time and place? What do their stories teach us as our church family continues towards a deeper understanding of our call today?

I am looking forward to sharing this journey with you.

QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS

Highlights from the Vestry Meeting May 2023

(June's Vestry Minutes haven't yet been approved so not included in this edition)

Treasurer:

Dave Ackerman reported that we are 1/3 of the way into 2023 and our Operating Account is within 5% of budget, with several income and expense items below budget. As of April 2023, we have had to withdraw \$40,000 from our investments to cover expenses. The Cellophane Flowers concert netted the church \$883.00.

Building and Grounds:

Rev. Cathie reported that our church was awarded a Diocese Grant of \$38,000 for our roof repairs. Once the monies are received, we will deposit back into our Capital Fund. Kathy Gabrielle reported that Judy Malhotra has a contact person for an installation of iron railings in the sanctuary leading to the altar. Kathy has asked Judy to get a quote for the June Vestry mtg.

Outreach:

Judy Malhotra reported that the May food drive for Oasis was a bit slow; however, 2 new people came to donate. The Food Drives will continue through the summer, and there will be a Diaper Drive on June 3rd. Rev. Cathie reported that the Food Pantry is going well and that she is submitting a grant to the Diocese to replenish supplies.

Memorial Garden:

A proposal from Horizon Landscaping of Wyckoff for a new/revised sprinkler system was submitted to the Memorial Garden Trustees, and it was approved 4 out of 5. This proposal then was presented to the Vestry at the May meeting and received Vestry approval.

Rev. Cathie:

- It has been confirmed that St. Bartholomew's Church is off the tax records for the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus regarding the Rectory.
- Beverley Wolff internment is June 25th and Jim Mathews is August 12th.

New Business:

Church Picnic – is slated for Welcome Back Sunday, September 10th instead of Father's Day.

Ho-Ho-Kus Day – is slated for Saturday, September 9th and our church will have a table manned by volunteers like last year with items representing our services and what we are involved in.

Arts at St. Bart's - the next scheduled event approved by the Vestry will be a free Chamber Music Concert on June 11th beginning at 2pm.

2023 David Hegg Award / **Senior Recognition** — will not occur this year by the Diocese but reconvene June of 2024. With that in mind, the Vestry will focus this year in honoring past seniors that were never given the chance to be honored for this award since St. Bartholomew's has just recently begun to submit names to the Diocese for this award.

Old Business:

Technology Ministry: The team is reviewing quotes on the desk needed to store the AV items that will be placed in the back of the sanctuary. Once the team has approved a quote, the quote will be presented to the Vestry for approval.

Marketing: Wayne Kamidoi reported that the Marketing team is brainstorming on possible "giveaways" to welcome newcomers, and to the attendees at our free Chamber Music Concert. Packets of seeds that are branded will be given out as a symbol of our recent church sermons "planting the seeds."







A SEVENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY

The number "1871" carved over the door in the Narthex is the year the main part of our church building was constructed. Originally it was a one-room schoolhouse on the north side of Hollywood Avenue just west of Sheridan Avenue. In 1904 the Ho-Ho-Kus Mission Association was formed and converted the

now vacant schoolhouse into a church, which was incorporated in 1914 as St. Bartholomew's Church.

In 1931 a parish house was erected on a plot of land on Sheridan Avenue which had been donated by a resident. So for a while St. Bartholomew's had a



PARISH HOUSE


On that day in 1948 a young couple, Angus and Thail Simpson, happened to be in town and saw the church being moved. They determined then and there to become members, and they were mainstays of St. Bart's for many years.

Our principal fundraisers were an Antiques Show and an Action Auction; Thail chaired the show and Angus was the auctioneer. They have said that if if we wanted to attract more new members, we should move the church around once in a while!

church and a parish house nearly a quarter mile apart. But in the fall of 1948 – just 75 years ago – the church was hoisted onto a truck, moved down Hollywood and Sheridan Avenues, and connected to the parish hall.

Over these past 75 years many improvements have been made to both the church and parish house, notably the unique etched glass windows in the church. We now have a beautiful facility which you see here. And despite the Simpsons' recommendation, we have no plans to move the church again!

MEMORIAL GARDEN RENOVATION

Back in the spring of 2022 it was decided that now is the time to renovate the Memorial Garden located on the side of the church. The Memorial Garden Trustees and Vestry agreed. We have the monies needed in the restricted funds. Michael Gnerre suggested we reach out to his friend, Greg Lotorto. Greg is a Landscape Architect. Greg supplied us with a complete landscape design; including types of plants, quantities needed and planting locations. Thank you, Greg, for this wonderful donation! The time and effort you spent on this project is greatly appreciated.

The plans were sent to several landscape companies resulting in interviews with three. The Memorial Garden Trustees discussed the interviews and unanimously decided to use Horizon Landscape Company. Since we decided to wait until the new roof project was completed the goal was to complete the renovation in the spring of 2023

In June of 2023 Horizon Landscape removed the existing plantings and replaced them with beautiful varieties; including Green Velvet Boxwood, Limelight Hydrangea, Lily Turf, Russian Cypress, Goldflame Spirea and Russian Sage. The sprinkler system was then repaired and renovated. Finally, mulch covered the ground.

The steps leading down to the garden have also been repaired. Aluminum railings have been installed on each side of the steps.

On September 10 the Memorial Garden will be blessed during our picnic. If you can, please join us.
