



beef could taste good) and we welcomed back Joe McCaffrey for another wonderful jazz concert. With all these events we lived into our proclamation that we can be in fellowship with God and our neighbors through the arts.

Our Morning Prayer and Bible Study meetings provided support, love and a safe place to dig into the Word of God and in doing so, receive the wisdom of God for each of us.

We brought our food ministry outreach from being inside our church to outside our church, inviting not only our parishioners but our neighbors to join us in feeding those in need.

We cared for each other and shared our stories and love for our church during stewardship programs. We went out into our community to say hello to our neighbors at Ho-Ho-Kus Day.

In 2022, instead of having someone from the Ramapo Tribe come and collect Christmas presents from us for their children, we delivered the gifts to them, and it was awesome. We met many wonderful people, participated in native prayer time, and participated in their telling of the Christmas story. This is only the beginning. We will be talking with the tribal leaders for other opportunities to share our stories and be in relationship in the years to come.

These are only some of the things that we did during pandemic. **We didn't just survive, we thrived.** 

We continued to explore our Come and See theme. Even though we have more study and conversation to have about this invitation from Jesus, we are now at a place where we need to go out into the neighborhood **boldly and lovingly and intentionally invite** our neighborhood, our community to come and see the St. Bartholomew's family. I invite you to join the planning team where we are developing some great ideas for opportunities

to reach out to our community.

We are truly Blessed. A few weeks ago I preached on the John 1:29-42 scripture that talks about Come and See and what I realized through my study is that Jesus, in asking people to Come and See, was inviting people to learn about his identity, who he was, and he did that by asking people to join him - follow him - as he went out into his community and beyond.

We need to do the same. I invite you to join with me in a three year plan to grow our mission and ministry and our presence in the community. I invite you to be a part of reaching a goal of having three new families (or individuals) per year for the next three years. That requires sharing our stories with others and asking them to come and see. When we offer these programs, attend them yourselves, invite others, and help people to learn about who we are.

As we go forward into 2023, I'd like us, as a church family, to think of more creative ways to get outside our walls and engage with our neighbors That is how we grow our family. That is how our community knows what the Episcopal Church in Ho-Ho-Kus is all about.

What are some diverse ways that we can love and serve them in Jesus's name? What are some ways that we can connect with those who are looking to find God in a welcoming and accepting community? How can we form a compelling invitation for everyone to Come and See? These are the questions that will guide our ministry in the years ahead.

These questions are blessings. They are blessings because they challenge us to stretch and grow. They challenge us to tap into the bounty of creativity that God wants to share with us. These questions challenge us to look inside ourselves to our own relationship with our God and ask how we can be

more intentional witnesses to the love of God for humanity.

I read this quote a few weeks ago, unfortunately there was no author named but I thought it captured the spirit and the possibilities that we have.

#### **QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS**

#### Highlights from the Vestry Meetings November-December 2022 and January 2023

#### Treasurer:

In general, Dave Ackerman reported that as of January 2023 our operating loss was almost \$3,000 less than budgeted and that our investments were down considerably due to the market performance. We have drawn \$65,000 from our General Fund for cash flow, and \$55,000 from our Capital Fund to cover the new roof expense. We ended 2022 with a total of \$172,951 in Income and \$224,712 in Expense. The Vestry approved the 2023 Budget at their January 15<sup>th</sup> meeting which will be presented to the Parish at the Annual Meeting of January 29, 2023.

Dave has advised the Vestry that due to the fraud that occurred with our Bank of America Checking account, the church has been forced to open a new account with the bank.

#### **Building and Grounds:**

The Vestry approved Layne Roofing of Wayne, NJ to install the entire roof of our Church/Parish Hall buildings in the amount of \$76,238. About \$20,000 was raised from our "call" to our parish members to cover the cost of the new roof. Rev. Cathie has submitted a request to the Diocese for a grant from the Ward Herbert Grant Committee, which could be up to 50% of the total expense, and if approved granted in February. Choice Electrical has installed the needed updated electrical switches and outlets in both upper classrooms of the Parish Hall and installed the replacement ceiling light fixture outside the sacristy due to water damage from the roof.

#### **Outreach:**

The Angel Tree for the Ramapo Indians for Christmas took place this year. Rev. Cathie, Marialyse Debel and Ghada Harb attended a Christmas Party with the Ramapo Indians at their facility. During this event the gifts that we collected were distributed to the children. As of December 2023, our Food Pantry is up and functional for distribution of food to those in need the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of each month. A coat drive was also held in December 2023 as part of the Food Pantry. Our Oasis Food Drives continue the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of each month.

The Outreach Committee is working on a plan for an ecumenical spiritual program with a labyrinth being possibly located at the far end of the Rectory property.

#### **Memorial Garden:**

The Memorial Garden Trustees have decided on Horizon Landscaping of Wyckoff to redo the side memorial garden in the Spring of 2023. In March 2023 with possible price increases, the committee chair, Peggy Kievit, will contact Horizon for a revised contract to present to the Vestry for their approval.

#### Rev. Cathie:

**Confirmation Classes** – The candidates are participating each volunteer scheduling in leadership during our worship service. They continue to meet both in-person and on Zoom. They are discerning what their project will be.

**Adult Bible Study –** Studies of the Gospel of Luke and during the Advent season "Because of Bethlehem" by Max Lucado. A Wednesday night study will begin on January 11<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

Weekly Prayer Listing and Request – Receiving positive responses.

**Taxation of our Rectory Property** – All information and completed forms have been given to our tax attorney. Rev. Cathie will follow up with our attorney on our tax appeal and how the State of NJ views tax situations like ours.

#### Fundraising:

Arts at St. Bart's: October 2022 Jazz Concert update: Our profit was \$528.00.

#### **New Business:**

**Rectory Tenant's Security –** was returned in full after Kathy Gabrielle, Ghada Harb and tenant Paul Young did a walk through on November 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022.

**Technology:** The church received a grant from the Marge Christie Technology of \$2,781.00 and a private gift for the full cost of the security desk in the current plan for the relocation of the AV system in the Sanctuary. Gift was \$4,445.00.

**Renewal of Lease for Ridgewood Symphony Orchestra** – Vestry approved a new lease beginning in March 2023 for a monthly contribution of \$130 to the church. NOTE: as of the January 2023 Vestry meeting the signed renew lease from the RSO not received.

**St. Bartholomew's Website Hacked** – Rev. Cathie stated in December 2022 that our website was hacked, and our internet specialist was working on the fix.

**HHK 8**<sup>th</sup> **Grade Graduation Committee** – has approached Rev. Cathie on seeking storage space for the items being prepared for the 2023 graduation party. Rev. Cathie will meet with them.

**Marketing** – Wayne Kamidoi presented the Vestry with information from the local papers on advertising our events. Vestry decided to place a ½ page ad for the two (2) times recommended for Arts at St Bart's Event," Cellophane Flowers" in April for the cost of \$183.00 and onetime processing fee of \$25.00.

**Tricky Tray** – since St. Bartholomew's has been granted a Gaming License, Rev. Cathie is planning to put together a team to present thoughts on what upcoming events are appropriate to having a raffle as part of the event.

**Christmas Gifts** – In December the following gifts were approved by the Vestry to our church employees: Pastor Rev. Cathie - \$1,500, Organist Soon Chung \$500, Sexton Bill Hughes \$250 and Parish Administrator Lori Van Caneghem \$100.

#### **Old Business:**

**Evangelism and Family Bible Study** – Peggy Kievit advised the Vestry that the church's website Is up and running with the Family Bible Study, but hard to tell if anyone is reading it.

**Stewardship 2023** – our program in 2022 for Stewardship of 2023 had a good response.

Last year's meeting minutes were approved, and reports of members and teams were presented. (Those reports were previously emailed to the parish; copies are available in the church office.)




Treasurer Dave Ackerman came prepared to defend his proposed 2023 operating budget, but it was unanimously approved.







#### ANGELS ALL AROUND US

Recently, Joan asked me to stop at The Fresh Market after I finished physical therapy. I was happy to do so. The Fresh Market is located at the end of a strip mall high above a steep hill with the parking spaces on the hillside. The market is on the smaller side with great quality food and produce. In addition, the employees are cheerful and very helpful to the customers, packing the grocery bags and putting the bags into the carts.

When I arrived, all three handicapped spaces were filled, forcing me to park in one of the spaces on the side of the hill. My list was small. I was to purchase three bundles of firewood and an assortment of fruit for my breakfasts. I found the wood immediately and after a struggle, placed three 15-pound log bundles into my cart. The fruit was easier. I found beautiful strawberries, blackberries, raspberries and blueberries all reasonably priced.

When I finished my list there was a woman standing at the end of her counter. I asked if she would "check me out". She smiled and replied, "I already have!" Excited about having a flirtatious moment at the age of 85, I happily left the store with my purchases. Heading down a rather steep incline the heavy cart tried to go fast but I was able to rein it in and lean it against the rear bumper of my car. As I began to unlock the car, the cart made a ninety-degree turn and took off down the hill with 45 pounds of wood, which only served to accelerate its speed. It headed down the hill like a guided missile, and I could only silently pray it did not hit a person or a car on the way down. When it reached the bottom it collided with a huge boulder, one of many placed to keep errant cars or carts from running into a drainage ditch, and tumbled over.

A woman across the way immediately headed down towards the scene of the disaster. Two cars away, another woman got out of her vehicle. She stood about 5 feet, 2 inches and weighed about 100 lbs. at most, and appeared to be in her late fifties or early sixties. Immediately she yelled to me, "Wait here, I've got this!" As she reached the bottom the first woman returned and as she got into her car I yelled over my thanks for her concern. Looking down the hill I watched the second woman, tiny as she was, upright the cart, lift the wood bundles and fruit back into it, and head back up the hill pushing 45 lbs. ahead of her. When she got to the car she held the cart while I loaded the wood and fruit into the car. She then held up an empty fruit container and said, "Your strawberries didn't make it. Just wait here and I'll get you a new one." Within a few minutes she was back with another box of strawberries. "I'm not sure they're as nice as the ones you picked out, but they're whole!" I assured her they were fine, and thanked her for helping me and being "my angel."

I have always believed that there are angels around us. They don't, of course, wear robes and have wings, but, nevertheless, they are present, and when there is an emergency, God somehow tells them to act. In this case, God chose a very unlikely person, but that is often the way God and Jesus work.

Joan and I went back to The Fresh Market recently and I recounted the story to the same check out woman, named Allison. She said she felt terrible about the cart incident and that I should always ask for assistance when going to the car. When I described "my angel" she said, "Oh, That sounds like Mary Jane from Produce!" The store manager overheard and also advised us to ask for assistance when leaving the store as well as promising to let Mary Jane know how much her help meant. Still, I hope someday to meet Mary Jane in person, and give my angel a hug!

## Can you stay one hour with me? The "Night Watch" of Holy Thursday



## Jesus challenges all of us to stay with him in the Garden and console him in his sorrow.

On Thursday of Holy Week, the Church remembers Christ's Last Supper with his apostles and sets the scene for what will happen the next day. During the celebration of the Lord's Supper, the liturgy re-enacts in a solemn way the movement of Jesus to the Garden of Gethsemane.

This tradition of adoring Our Lord on Holy Thursday is often called the "Night Watch" or "Gethsemane Watch" and recalls how Jesus invited his apostles to stay with him while he prayed.

And he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death; remain here, and watch." (Mark 14:34)

In essence people are asked to accompany Jesus to the Garden and console him during his great agony. All one needs for prayer on this sacred night is to simply imagine the scene and enter the sacred night before Jesus' death on the cross. It is extremely powerful to imagine being there with Jesus in the Garden, as he prepares to sacrifice himself for our sins.


