who plants and the man who waters have one purpose, and each will be rewarded according to his own labor. – (1 Corinthians 3:6-8 NIV)

These words from Paul's first letter to the church at Corinth remind us of the privilege we have to be able to plant seeds of faith in the lives of the people we meet as well as our neighbors and families. It is a privilege to join God in this mission and an honor to receive gifts, the tools that we need, to be ready to offer the invitation to be in relationship with our loving savior.

These gifts are the Fruits of the Spirit and fruits start as seed. In Paul's letter to the Galatians, 5:22-23, he names these foundational attributes, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control." # **QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS**

# Highlights from the Vestry Meetings February-March-April 2023

### Treasurer:

In general, Dave Ackerman reported that as of April 2023 we are close to budget. Prepaid pledge payments and investment income are below budget, but so are several church properties expenses; notably snow-plowing / de-icing due to the mild winter. To date we have had to withdraw \$33,000 from our investments for cash flow purposes due to reduced contributions and the payment of real estate taxes to the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus before our tax situation on the Rectory was resolved. As of April 2023, we have had a total of \$32,492 in income and \$59,196 in expenses.

# **Building and Grounds:**

As of February 2023, the church has hired a second sexton, Terrence Hughes (Bill's father) to help with items around the church and rectory. Terrence and Bill will share the monthly work hours. The church received a proposal from VCE Construction to remove the carpeting and refinish the flooring in front of the Eagle Pedestal in the sanctuary to place one of the pews removed from the area where the new AV system will be placed. The proposal of \$2,500 was considered high, so Kathy Gabrielle will be pursuing other proposals. First Choice Electric was hired to install "clear grounded" electrical outlets in the sanctuary to enable a clearer sound when we are using the audio mixing board for performances in the sanctuary. The installation of handrails in the sanctuary for the steps to the altar is being investigated. The Diocese has granted St. Bartholomew's \$38,000 from the Ward J. Herbert Foundation to replenish the monies the church used for the new church building's roof.

### **Outreach:**

**St. Bartholomew's Food Pantry**: St. Bartholomew's is now registered with the State of NJ to operate a Food Pantry. Our pantry opened in January with scheduled second Saturdays of each month to be open for the disbursement of food from our stocked shelves for those in need.

**Oasis Monthly Food Drives** are still going strong the last Saturday of each month.

**St. Hubert's Animal Shelter** received donated pet food and toys, etc. in April from our church. This year's Confirmation Class's project was a focus on "the gift of animals" so they organized our pet collection and a field trip to the Shelter to learn more about this organization and to deliver the donated items on April 29th.

**The Outreach Committee** is hoping to meet the first week of May to resume their thoughts and planning for an ecumenical spiritual program with a labyrinth being possibly located at the far end of the Rectory property and other projects.

**House on the Hill – Goshen Diaper Drive** was conducted in March, and the items were delivered to Goshen by Peggy Kievit. The church received a beautiful thank you note from Sister Jean on the much-needed supply of diapers that the House received from St. Bartholomew's.

# **Memorial Garden:**

With the recommendation by the Memorial Garden Trustees for Horizon Landscaping of Wyckoff to redo the plantings and grass area of the side memorial garden this Spring of 2023, the Vestry approved their choice. After additional consideration of two companies for the refurbished irrigation of the side Memorial Garden, the Trustees chose Horizon Landscaping of Wyckoff. The Vestry also approved Horizon for the irrigation of the side Memorial Garden. A start date should be the beginning of June.

<u>Adult Studies:</u> Rev. Cathie Studwell is conducting Thursday morning Bible Studies on Luke with a good attendance, and Wednesday night study of I & 2 Peter.

# Fundraising:

### Arts at St. Bart's:

**Cellophane Flowers Concert** with a small reception afterwards was held on Sunday, April 23rd. Everyone that attended enjoyed the lovely music of Cellophane Flowers, the opportunity to meet the members of the group at the reception and purchase signed CD's. Our church made a profit of \$888.93 from this event.

**Chamber Music Event** planned for Sunday, June 11<sup>th</sup>. This is being billed as a "free concert" since a parishioner has graciously agreed to subsidize the musicians' fees. The church is hopeful for donations.

### **New Business:**

**Bishop Carlye Hughes visits St. Bartholomew's.** We were pleased to have Bishop Hughes conduct our Sunday Service on March 5th. She also joined us for coffee hour, and she met with members of the Vestry for a small discussion.

**St. Bartholomew's is a Smoke Free campus –** due to an issue of a small fire in an outside smoker station in the front of the church under a cherry tree. AA, other groups, and individuals using our church grounds will have to adhere to our outside "nonsmoking" policy.

**2023 Diocese Parochial Report** was approved by the Vestry showing that our church has a total of 79 members.

**2023 Community Garden** – has been weeded, rototilled, restored, and planted for this 2023 season by our avid gardeners. The Garden team has asked to get a price from the firm redoing the memorial garden irrigation for a water spigot near the Community Garden.

**Confirmation Class** – This year's two candidates Keyanna Studwell and Austin Hintz received their confirmation from Bishop Hughes on April 6<sup>th</sup> at St. Michaels in Wayne. A reception for them sponsored by the Vestry was on Sunday, April 7<sup>th</sup> following our Sunday service.

**Parish Hall and Sanctuary Usage Rates**. The Vestry approved an increase for the rental of our facilities beginning April 2023 as follows: \$300 to non-members and \$150 for members of the church for a 4-hr. rental period usage of the Parish Hall, and a \$250 fee for non-members of the church for the use of the Sanctuary.

**Parish Administrator Leaving**: Our Parish Administrator, Lori Van Caneghem has given notice that she is leaving her position on June 9<sup>th</sup>, 2023, to care for herself and family. Ann Woods has agreed to work for the church as a consultant on Saturdays this summer to help with the financial duties (including help with the upcoming Diocese Audit) until we have an Administrator replacement. A job notice for a bookkeeper will begin the first week of June, with the hopes that the church will have someone in this position by the beginning of September or sooner. The church will also be posting a job position for an office assistant to manage the phones and other church tasks.

### **Old Business:**

**Ridgewood Symphony Orchestra** did sign another lease with the increased monthly contribution for the term of March 1, 2023, through February 29, 2024.

**Rectory Tax Situation** has been settled with the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus. The Borough has agreed, without having to go to court, that the Rectory property has been taken off the Borough's tax book records. This is a welcome financial relief to the church.

**Technology** – The team is still awaiting a proposal for the updated security desk needed for the transformation of the AV system to the back of the sanctuary. Once this updated proposal is received and the Technology team approves, this proposal will be brought to the Vestry for approval.

**Gaming License.** Rev. Cathie is hopeful for a group to meet soon to decide on the correct event for the usage of our gaming license for raffles, etc.

This was not a planned activity.

At the end of our Maundy Thursday service, I fell down the two steps alongside the organ. I didn't feel really hurt, but my St. Bart's friends jumped into action, making me comfortable and calling 911. The police were there within minutes, and the EMTs quickly followed. They convinced me to be checked out at the hospital, so they put me on a stretcher, loaded me into the ambulance, and off we went to Valley Hospital's emergency room. X-rays showed I had only bruises and no broken bones, so the doctor discharged me and I was home less than 3 hours after my fall.

I am so grateful to everyone who was involved: Ho-Ho-Kus Patrolman Kim and Sergeant Mosca, Ambulance Corps EMTs Gary Tyler and his daughter Julie, the professional and efficient staff of Valley Hospital, and of course my fellow church members. And especially Michael Gnerre, who kept me company in the hospital. After I was discharged, he and Rita drove me back to the church to get my car and followed me home to be sure I got home safely.

Judy Malhotra had the presence of mind to photograph me on the floor (but should have gotten one of me on the stretcher in the ambulance!)

Ho-Ho-Kus is very fortunate to have such a dedicated, hard-working group of volunteers, on call 24/7/365 for all kinds of emergency situations. Thanks Be To God for them!

# HOUSE ON THE HILL

\*\*\*\*

For over 30 years St. Bartholomew's has been contributing to House on the Hill as part of our outreach program. Marjorie and Harold Taylor introduced the program with annual toiletries drive among other projects. Presently, we have quarterly Diaper and toiletry drives. The Director, Sister Jean Graffweg, is very grateful to receive the many generous gifts we donate to the children and their families. To better

understand what House on the Hill is, I am sharing some information taken from their profile.

Agri-Business Child Development, founded in 1946, is committed to providing the highest quality early childhood education and social services to farm workers and other eligible families across New York State. Children, eight weeks old through school age, benefit from the culturally and linguistically diverse programming recognized nationally as a hallmark of Agri-Business Child Development.



On June 15, 1972, the Sisters of St. Dominic, in collaboration with Dominican College students, the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets, and many remarkable volunteers, opened the House on the Hill Migrant Child Care Center. After several years, House on the Hill joined the network of Agri-Business Child Development centers.

As a provider of Migrant and Seasonal Head Start, Agri-Business Child Development ensures that each child receives comprehensive educational, health and social services. ABCD at Goshen-House on the Hill is accredited by the National Association for the Education of young children.

Eligibility requirements for local agricultural workers, as well as the Migrant and Seasonal Head Start program include household income, employment status, and child(ren)s' age(s). The center utilizes a system of points, in accordance with the Head Start Program Performance Standards, to ensure that the neediest of eligible families receive services.


