



Rev. Cathie's Reflections

"Behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people." – Luke 2:10

Christmas is the season where joy takes center stage. The angel's proclamation to the shepherds was not simply about happiness, it was about a deep, abiding joy that comes from God's gift of salvation. This joy is not limited to one night in Bethlehem; it is a joy that continues to move throughout history, reaching into our lives today.

Joy at Christmas is found in the wonder of the Incarnation: God choosing to dwell among us, to share our humanity, and to redeem our brokenness. It is the joy of knowing that *"The light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it"* (John 1:5). It is the most joyous news of all that into the dark world there would come a light, a great light! A light which no darkness can overcome. Which is, when you think about it, why

is joy such good news? It is the joy of Emmanuel, God with us, bringing peace to troubled hearts and hope to weary souls.

The angel's greeting to the shepherds that first Christmas night is now God's greeting to us. It is a greeting which still brings us boundless joy. Because it tells us the source of that joy: The birth of our Savior, Christ the Lord. It is because the joy of Christmas comes to all, regardless of our circumstances. It does not depend on anything in this world. This joy is eternal and unchangeable. The greatest gift we can ever receive.

And we know where this joy was found, in a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger. This child came into this world to bring us joy.

When we turn to that first Christmas, happiness is not the theme that rises to the surface. Mary and Joseph were compelled to travel far from home because of a government decree. They found no suitable place to stay, even as Mary was about to give birth. There were no doctors, nurses, or midwives to assist her, and no family nearby to comfort her.

And the shepherds? Though visited by an angel and surrounded by a

multitude of heavenly hosts, they were not promised relief from hardship. They learned that their Savior had been born, and that they would find him wrapped in cloth and lying in a manger.

The Savior we awaited did not come to erase our struggles or guarantee happiness. He came to bring joy. This joy is the heartbeat of the Christmas story. The angels proclaimed “good news of great joy” not merely because the Messiah was born, but because he was born as our Savior. Jesus came not only to share in our humanity, but to redeem us, assuring us that nothing in this world can separate us from God’s love in Christ Jesus. This joy is real, enduring, and stronger than anything else we face.

Joy is not simply the absence of sorrow, nor is it dependent on circumstances. Scripture reminds us that joy is rooted in God’s presence and promises. In Christ, joy becomes a steady companion. Jesus tells His disciples, *“I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete”* (John 15:11). This joy is not fragile; it endures trials, sustains hope, and strengthens weary hearts. It is a joy that sings even in the valley because

it knows the Shepherd walks beside us.

Joy is a radiant gift, often discovered in the simplest of moments like a child’s laughter, sunlight spilling through a window, or the quiet assurance of being loved. Unlike happiness, which can fade with circumstances, joy is rooted deeply in gratitude, hope, and connection. It is our song, reminding us that life is more than what we see or feel in the present. Joy helps the heart to grow, opening us to generosity, resilience, and wonder, and inviting us to live with a spirit that honors the sacred woven into everyday life.

As we gather around trees, candles, and carols, may we remember that true joy is not in the gifts we give or receive, but in the Gift already given, Christ Himself. Let us carry this joy beyond the season, let us choose joy, not as denial of life’s challenges, but as a declaration of faith and the foundation of our discipleship. May joy shape our worship, inspire our service, embrace our daily lives, our journey as disciples, so that others may see in us the radiant love and strength of the Lord.

QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS

Vestry Highlights – June through October 2025

Treasurer:

The latest Treasure's report by Dave Ackerman shows January through October 2025 the church has had a total income of \$139,841 with total expenses of \$210,745. For our 2025 budget, contributions are more than \$3,000 over budget, investment income is \$9,000 over budget, whereas donations from AA are under, altar supplies are over budget due to the purchase of the needed altar linens, and marketing is over budget due to the EDDM Springtime card mailing. As of October 2025, a total of \$126,000 had to be transferred out from our Edward Jones General account to cover expenses.

In compliance with our in-house accountant, Jack Konzelmann's recommendations, the original concept of allocating funds from the Susan Cordes Blackwood bequest to certain line items, has been abolished.

The funds from this bequest are now all part of the Edward Jones General account to be transferred for needed line items when requested.

The profits on Arts at St. Bart's events are now considered profits under operating income.

Year End adjustments to the Restricted Funds to properly reflect the financial statements will be made quarterly for the Vestry's review.

The Vestry will no longer approve the monthly Treasurer's Reports since these reports can only be approved once they are audited. The Vestry will review and ask questions on the monthly reports, and once all questions have been answered, the monthly reports will be filed for our accountant's audit and approval.

Building and Grounds:

Kathy Gabrielle has overseen the following repairs and services to the church and rectory from June through October.

Solar timed bulbs installed in the outdoor fixtures on the rectory's home.

New hose reel and nozzle installed on the church building in the front memorial garden to eliminate a reel being on the ground of blessed areas.

US Apex Gutter Company fixed 3 areas of the church gutters and replaced all gutters on the Rectory.

RJ Plumbing installed new faucets in both the woman's and men's bathrooms.

First Choice Electric has brought all the four post lights in the side memorial garden up to code by rewiring through in ground conduit since they were not originally installed properly. Also included with this work was the rewiring and conduit installation of the actual electrical wiring that comes from the church building to these post lights.

Mahwah Tree Company removed one dead Plum Tree, and dead limbs with pruning of lower branches of 8 trees (Pine and Spruces) on the property of the rectory.

Outreach:

Oasis:

Oasis Scholarships: In June, The Vestry approved giving a scholarship of \$800 to a child of Oasis to attend 4 weeks of the WMCA camp in Wyckoff, and a donation of \$2,500 to a high school graduate from Oasis that was planning to attend college.

Oasis Food Drives: Monthly food donations are going well.

Food Pantry and Bart's Closet: The three Saturdays that our Pantry and Closet are open each month see a steady flow of about 25 people. The average cost of groceries is \$400 per opening. A small refrigerator is now in place to keep milk, eggs, butter, and a few vegetables for distribution. Carol Guzzo-Flug is participating in this ministry by placing orders for delivery to her home on cleaning supplies and some food items. She is also a regular baker of goodies for our café in the pantry for each of our Saturdays.

Outreach Center (The Rectory): The summer's Performing Arts Camp was a success. A minicamp is planned after Easter and a two-week summer camp with one week of visual and one week of performing arts are planned.

Outreach Discernment Team: A free-standing library box was purchased and installed by the Labyrinth to house brochures with vision of the structure and directions for walking it.

Rev. Cathie:

Office Position: The office now has two new PT employees. George DiPasquale is the assistant in the office for administrative tasks. George is currently working on the updating of our church directory. Amanda Giacchetti is the assistant for development for our “Sharing the Good News Programs.” Amanda is also the assistant director for our Performing Arts Workshops, and the developer of the new format of our 8.5x14 Sunday Service bulletins. Both George and Amanda are helping with the update of our website.

Studies: The Wednesday evening group continues with the book of Acts and Thursday morning group will be starting the Gospel of John.

Sunday School: Will be offered in December for Advent.

Parish Retreat Day: Is planned for Saturday February 21st.

Vestry member resignation: Andrew Sommerfeld resigned from the Vestry due to his present work commitments and his move to a much further distance from church.

New Business

Stewardship 2025: Began on October 12th for a 6-week program with November 23rd being Stewardship Sunday with the focus on Discipleship as a Foundation of Stewardship. The Baptismal Covenant was used as a focus in this learning.

Altar Guild: With Ghada Harb’s assistance the church now has a new white frontal and accessory replacements (burse & veil, urn cover and chasuble) totaling the cost of \$3,816.50.

Spanish Worship Services: Services will be offered during the Saturdays of Advent in the morning when the food pantry is open.

ESL Program: Classes for English as a Second Language could be offered soon led by the church’s Spanish teacher and other volunteers.

Marketing: The Marketing Team, with Wayne Kamidoi’s assistance, has been busy working on an EDDM mailing to promote our Christmas Services and to highlight what the church has been involved with since the last mailing.

Old Business:

Spanish Classes: Our Classes that began on May 13th and that are continuing, are going well.

Technology: The two desks purchased to store all the technical items needed to broadcast our services by Zoom and Facebook, and to show the services on the 2 TV screens in the Sanctuary, have been installed and are very functional.





Learn more about Yoga for Christians



At the start of the **2025 Diocesan Convention** in November, Bishop Carlye Hughes recognized people and congregations in thanks for their support in the past year. **St. Bartholomew's** was thanked for our tithe on the blessing that we received from **Susan Cordes Blackwood**. The Bishop shared that it came as an answer to the prayers of the staff because there was a large shortfall in their cash flow. It was our gift that helped them get through their tough times.

In her sermon at the 151st Diocesan Convention, Bishop Hughes reminded us that Jesus calls us to follow him out into the world – especially when there is disruption, as there is now. Referencing the Gospel lesson, Luke 5:27-32, she urged us to see ourselves as Levi, called by Christ and sent out to carry God's life-changing love into a hurting world.

In her Convention sermon, Bishop Hughes highlighted several resources that she encourages people to read, study, and reflect on.

Books

Reconciliation: The Ubuntu Theology of Desmond Tutu and **Ubuntu: I in You and You in Me** by the Very Rev. Michael Battle, Ph.D., Theologian-In-Community at Trinity Church Boston. Battle is widely known for his work on reconciliation, spirituality, and the theology of Ubuntu.

Love Alone by Fr. Hans Urs van Balthasar, 20th century Swiss Roman Catholic theologian. This book is a great entry into his theology and helps us grow our understanding and appreciation of God's love in our lives, churches, and diocese.

Bishop Hughes also spoke about the four key focus areas that came out of the **Strategic Visioning Project**:

- Formation and Support for the First Third of Life
- Care for People and Planet
- Congregational Collaboration
- Communication

The next issue of *The VOICE Online* will include an update on what's happening in these four areas and how we can get involved.

Marjorie Lee Morris, 97, of Waldwick, NJ, passed away peacefully on All Saints Day, Saturday, November 1, 2025. Born in Philadelphia, PA, she grew up in Audubon, NJ and moved to Waldwick in 1950, where she resided since.


